



SAIPE DATA COMPARISON FY2016 & FY2017






FY2016 SAIPE Data Comparison to FY2017 1 7/6/2016







\$15,000 Minimal Allocation



An LEA must qualify for a grant of at least \$15,000 under the formula to receive an allocation, or it must enter into a consortium that meets the minimum allocation requirement. A state may waive this minimum allocation requirement in any case in which the LEA is in a rural, sparsely populated area and demonstrates that it is unable to enter a consortium to provide CTE activities.

If a system is granted a waiver, the system must provide students the opportunity to be CTAE concentrators, align CTAE programs with business and industry through the use of business advisors, provide students an opportunity to earn an industry credential, certificate or licensure in programs where available and provide students an opportunity to participate in a CTAE program that is classified as High-Skill, High-Wage and/or High-Demand. GaDOE Accountability and Finance Unit will provide technical assistance annually to LEAs falling below the \$15,000 entitlement.

This may change after our monitoring visit. Perkins law says that an LEA is not fundable under the \$15,000 threshold unless in a consortium. We have been accepting your request for waiver from everyone. We may be out of compliance.

Perkins Grant Award



- ✓ You will only be able to draw down a maximum of 25% of your grant from July 1, 2016, to September 30, 2016.
- √The remaining 75% will be available to draw down from October 1, 2016, through June 30, 2017.






- Mark Your Calendar September 30, 2016, is the deadline for all FY17 CTAE budgets to be completed on the Consolidated Application
 - Con App Coordinator and Superintendent must sign off on ALL FY17 CTAE budgets by 5:00 p.m.





Tip #1 (cont'd)



- Any system that has not signed off on any grant budgets by 5:00 p.m. on September 30, 2016, is at risk of being required to return funds to the state.
- If this happens, the superintendent must submit a letter explaining why the grant was not signed off and what measures will be taken to prevent this from reoccurring. A decision will be made if funds will be awarded to the system.
- Systems must notify GaDOE by September 30, 2016, through <u>Lplan@doe.k12.ga.us</u> of any federal or state grant funds they will not be able to use during the fiscal period for which the funds were awarded.

Function Code	Used to Budget Funds
1000	Expenses are directly related to student instruction
2210	Expenses are directly related to assisting instructional staff (planning, developing, evaluating, etc.)
2230*	Expenses for CTAE Director for administration expense
2300*	Expenses for Federal indirect costs and State single audit fees
2400*	Expenses for CTAE Supervisor

^{*} Must be within the 5% Federal Administrative CAP.

**You are considered a "Director" for budgeting purposes if you have system-level CTAE duties regardless of your local title, or location of your office.

Tip #2 (cont'd)



- Any travel expenses paid for staff travel should be coded to object code 580, not object code 810. This includes payments made directly to a hotel.
- Registration associated with travel is the only expense that may be prepaid providing the deadline is prior to the end of the fiscal period.
- Cheaper airfare or hotel accommodations is not a permissible reason to prepay. If prepayment is made, it must be as an accrued expenditure that is expensed during the fiscal period in which the charge occurred.





- Provide a specific and detailed budget description of each expenditure
- Avoid simply providing the object code description
- Provide a detailed yet concise budget description



Tip # 3 (cont'd)



 Provide a specific and detailed budget description of each expenditure

General Description	Specific/Detailed Description
Expendable computer equipment	14 desktop computers for Business Lab
Registration, dues and fees	Registration for 20 CTAE teachers to attend GACTE Conference
Supplies	Classroom/lab supplies for 24 CTAE teachers at three high schools






- Budget <u>up to 5</u>% of the Program Improvement grant for administrative cost (Function codes 2230, 2300 & 2400)
 - Round down to avoid exceeding the budget cap

Example: Grant allocation \$49,172 5% of \$49,172 = \$2,458.60 5% cap = \$2,458 **not** \$2,459





- Avoid budgeting benefits for substitutes and professional development stipends
 - Only employee benefit allowed is TRS excluding the Ag Young Farmer grant which allows state health insurance
 - Use specific object code 230 for TRS(14.27%)

 - Budget Descriptions
 - Teacher Retirement Systems (TRS) Calculation Spreadsheet

When are Budget Amendments Required?



- Anytime funds are moved from one FUNCTION CODE to another FUNCTION CODE, an amendment is required
 - Example: Move \$1,200 from **1000**-580 to **2210**-810



When are Budget Georgia's School Superintendent "Educating Georgia's Future" Amendments Required? (cont'd)

 Anytime funds are moved from one OBJECT **CODE** to another **OBJECT CODE**, an amendment is required if moving more than 25% of the amount budgeted for that object code

- Example: \$1,000 budgeted under 1000-610 25% of \$1,000 = \$250 Move \$275 to 1000-810

QBE/FTE Expenditure Comparison Chart





Go Build Georgia Grant Application

Go Build Georgia (GBG) and the Go Build Georgia Foundation have partnered with the Career, Technical and Agricultural Education Division (CTAE) of the Georgia Department of Education (GDOE) to award Go Build Georgia Grants to GDOE middle and high school institutions for GBG-aligned special activities.

To be considered for a grant award, a Georgia middle or high school must submit an electronic application to CTAE, where it will receive initial vetting and approval before being forwarded to GBG for final consideration.



In order to be considered for award, grant applications must:

- 1. be submitted on behalf of a GDOE institution (middle or high school grade level);
- 2. be intended for a GBG-aligned special activity or event;
- 3. be intended for an activity that does not regularly occur and for which funding is not otherwise available;
- 4. be intended for an activity that conforms to GDOE CTAE program regulations;
- 5. completed in full with sufficient detail.

Grants will be awarded from the GBG Foundation in the amount of up to \$500. The funds will be sent to the institution from the GBG Foundation through a reimbursement process to be applied loward the purpose specified in the grant application. The number of grants awarded each fiscal year will be determined by funding availability as well as the strength of applications received.

"Dear Colleague:" - Gender Equity Letter







OCR and OCTAE issued "Significant Guidance" in the form of a "Dear Colleague Letter" to remind recipients of Perkins funds of their responsibilities under Title IX and the 1979 OCR Guidelines. This guidance places an affirmative responsibility on recipients to respond to disproportionate enrollments of one sex by reviewing counseling practices, and taking "proactive steps" to increase enrollment of the underrepresented sex. OCR/OCTAE identifies "education careers" as one of the areas significantly underrepresented by males. I do not think States were historically using Perkins funds to support education careers, but the definition of CTE in the 2006 Amendments would arguably include it. This Guidance also provides that the SEA responsibility extends to the State's distribution of State funds as well as Federal funds.

- Approximately half of State Plan requirements would be removed
- Local plans would be simplified



What Will Perkins V Look Like? (House Version)

- State's could miss MOE without penalty once in a five year period
- A penalty would be assessed for the second shortfall in a five year period
- State could reserve 10 15% of the Basic Grant pass through dollars to award outside of the formula for innovation for in-demand industries and occupations




